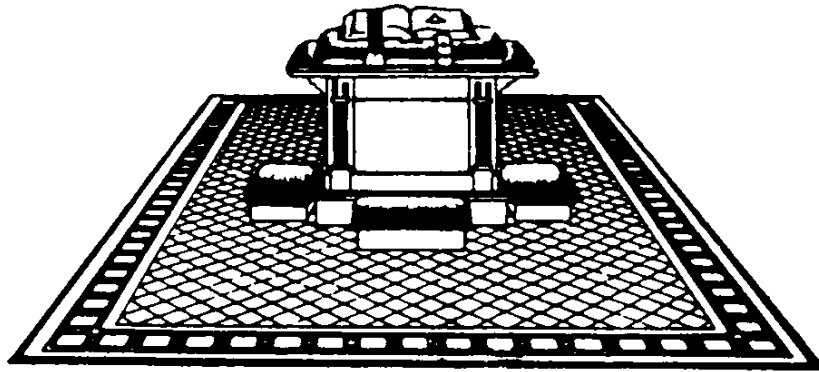

Are You Duly and Truly Prepared?

A bit about Ira will be printed at the end. Suffice to say, Ira Gilbert carried the Illinois Lodge of Research for many years alongside a few others. And now without any further delay - "Are You Duly and Truly Prepared?"*

My Brothers, you became my brothers as soon as you took upon yourself the obligation of the Entered Apprentice degree. When you entered the door of your Lodge for the first time two questions were asked of you. The first was whether your entry into the Lodge was of your own free will and accord. The second was asked of the Junior Deacon, who was conducting you on your admission into the Lodge, was whether you were duly and truly prepared. These two questions are inter-related.

Was your entry into our fraternity of your own free will and accord? Did any one entice you into becoming a Freemason? When the Investigating Committee spoke to you and your significant other were you asked the reasons for your desire to become a Freemason? Were you offered a copy of "On The Threshold" a pamphlet that explains the journey that you are now undertaking or some other material given by your Grand Lodge?

As an extension of the query of your free will for entry into Freemasonry, you should have been informed that being a Freemason grants you entry into an elite fraternity of brothers. A Masonic Lodge is far more than being merely a social or charitable

organization. The social and charitable activities of your lodge are important. You may be attracted to the social and charitable endeavors of the lodge. These are certainly laudable activities for every lodge to undertake. However, a Masonic lodge is also a place for moral and philosophical enlightenment.



As experienced Masons, we envy the path that lies ahead for you in our brotherhood of Freemasonry. After taking your obligation in the Entered Apprentice Degree, you heard an explanatory lecture on the symbolism and meaning of the ritual that you had just completed. In the ritual for each of the three degrees in Blue Lodge Masonry there are some ninety items that require symbolic explanation. The explanations presented to you in the degrees are only a start in understanding what Freemasonry really means.

Bro. Rollin C. Blackmer edited and produced a series of lectures about our fraternity. His book was entitled, "The Lodge and the Craft". It was first published in the year 1923. In the first lecture Bro. Blacker remarked that in the year 1923 there were approximately 100,000 brethren in the State of Missouri. Of these 100,000 brethren only about 75 men had made a significant study of the symbolism, philosophy, and history of this Brotherhood to which they belonged. He went on to state that it was a lamentable state of affairs that the majority of its members were ignorant of most everything connected with Freemasonry. There are many reasons for this regrettable state of

affairs.

The first of these reasons lies in the fact that our fraternity is now approaching the 300th year of its existence. Much has transpired in the past 300 years. The fraternity cries out for its new brethren to take upon themselves a study of what the principles of our brotherhood really are and mean.

You have joined a group of men who are the elite of society. You should consider yourself a Masonic brother to George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Paul Revere, John Hancock, thirteen signers of our United States Constitution, and nine signers of the Declaration of Independence. You are a brother to a myriad of other Freemasons, such as Gene Autry, Ernest Borgnine, W. C. Fields, Clark Gable, Roy Rogers, Davy Crocket, George M. Cohan, Irving Berlin, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, General Douglas MacArthur and General Leonard Wood. I can go on and on listing the brethren who you can now call your brothers. You are fortunate, indeed, for having been welcomed into this great fraternity.

Were you duly and truly prepared to enter the Lodge hall to take upon yourself the obligations of Freemasonry. This query can be considered on two levels.

First of all, you were asked to divest yourself of all metals and wear a suit suitable to your degree. You were hoodwinked (blindfolded) and a rope (cable-tow) was placed about you. The meaning of these preparation and symbols were explained to you. In this context you were undoubtedly duly and truly prepared to enter to lodge hall.

However, were you also duly and truly prepared in your mind and ready to start your journey in Freemasonry? In Freemasonry, it is true that your family and means of earning a living are predominant. And, I do not mean to imply that you are expected to become a Masonic scholar, while this would certainly be a laudable accomplishment. But, it is important that you understand what it really means to become a Mason. Are you duly and truly prepared to attend the meetings of your lodge, to the best of your ability? A Masonic Lodge is only as good as the brethren that are active in its affairs.

Are you duly and truly prepared to learn what it means to be a Mason and live according to Masonic precepts? Freemasonry is an organization dedicated to making good men better. You are already thought

to be a good man or you would not have passed the test of the ballot box and been admitted to your Lodge. A study of Freemasonry will give you the tools to become a better man. Properly implemented, your family and society, in general, will applaud your dedication to Masonic principles.

So, my Brother, I welcome you into our fraternity. There are many in your Lodge who will aid your quest into the philosophy, symbolism, and history of our Order. You should find something that piques your interest in our Brotherhood. There are five basic areas of interest in studying Freemasonry. These are history, philosophy, symbolism, law, and ritual (its memorization and meaning). Find an area that is of interest to you and pursue it. There are dedicated brothers who will help you as you take upon yourself the journey to learn what it really means to be a Mason.

My Brothers, I will close this presentation with a saying by the noted Masonic author, H. L. Haywood. His words may indicate to you the basic premise of Freemasonry, "Not More Men In Masonry, But More Masonry In Men".

About Ira Gilbert: Bro. Ira Gilbert was raised on January 8, 1968 in Isaac Cutter Lodge #1073 and was Master in 1972. Isaac Cutter Lodge merged with Chicago Lodge #437 and was a member of Chicago Lodge. Bro Gilbert was a member of A. O. Fay Lodge #676 as well. He was also a member of the Valley of Chicago Scottish rite.

Bro. Ira's dedication to Masonic Education had afforded him the ability to serve on the Grand Lodge Committee on Masonic Education and the Grand Lodge Committee on Jurisprudence. Bro. Ira came from a Masonic family, his father being Master of Universal Lodge #985, now a part of Decalogue Lodge through a series of mergers. His father was also a Grand Lecturer.

Ira's main interests in our fraternity had lain in the philosophy and history of our ritual and in Masonic Jurisprudence. Bro. Ira was a DDGM twice. He was also a fellow of the Illinois Lodge of Research and the ILOR awarded him the Andrew Torok Medal.

How Does Your Masonic Initiation Affect You Today?

When I first entered a Masonic Lodge, I had no idea what to expect. I didn't know any Masons, and I didn't know what it meant to be one. I went through the motions of my initiation, going where I was led and saying what I was asked to say. I thought it was a neat experience, but I can't say it meant much to me.

Looking back on that event almost 15 years later, I am beginning to see what actually happened. A seed was planted. I'm still not sure if it was an idea, a concept, or even a promise to my future self. Maybe it was a combination of things, but it was planted nonetheless. I realize that my initiation means much more to me today and influences me more profoundly than I ever could have predicted. I expect that it will continue to grow with each passing year.

One small example of the effect I am referring to happened to me about a year ago. Out of the clear blue sky, the thought came to me that I would no longer speak profanity. There was no particular reason. There was no conscious thought of self-improvement or that this might be something nice to do. It just came to me. I now find myself using the word "Crumb" in the place where I would have otherwise used an expletive. I have no idea why. It's ridiculous, I know, but I suppose it's still an improvement.

Was that thought a fruit from the seed that was planted at my initiation? Maybe. I think it was. It feels like it was. It took an awfully long time for my seed to start growing, but some of us have rougher ashlar than others. I would love to think that there is some invisible common gavel working automatically within each of us, suggesting this or that part should be next to be removed.

I invite you to think back to your initiation. How did you feel? Can you remember the moment the hood-wink was removed? What thoughts were going through your head as you took your obligation? Now consider what it means to you now. Today. This moment.

Can you see evidence that a seed was planted the night of your initiation? How much different are you now from the man you were then?

If you'd like to accelerate the process, you can pour a little water on that seed with some mindfulness.

Remember the day you became a Freemason. How does that affect you today?

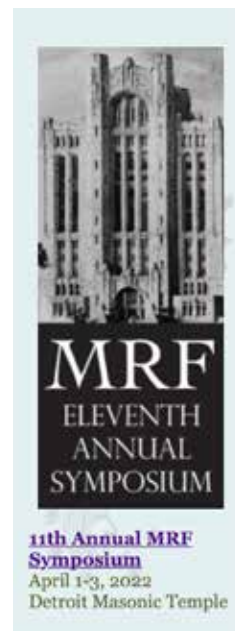

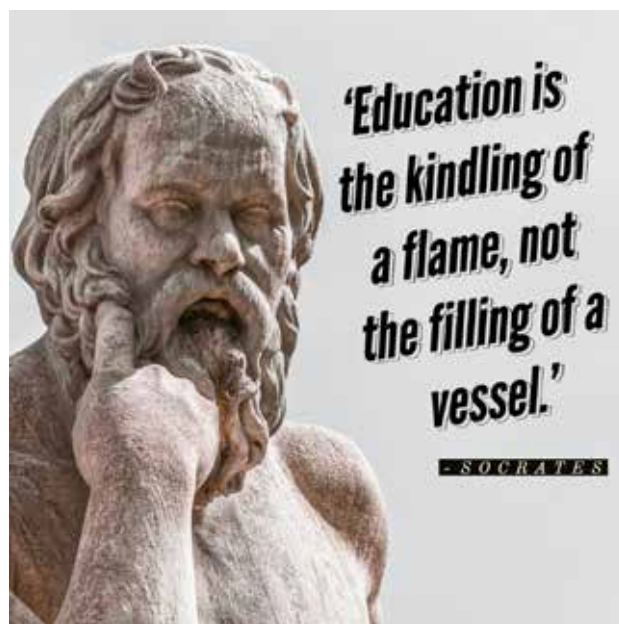

The Passing of RWB Thomas W. Jackson

On December 30, 2021, Masonic social media announced the passing of RWB Thomas W. Jackson. What quickly followed was a large number of tributes and memories that brothers had reflecting upon the life and impact of RWB Jackson.

If you are not familiar with RWB Jackson, he was the past Grand Secretary of the Right Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Pennsylvania. He had also served as the first Executive Secretary of the World Conference of Regular Masonic Grand Lodges from 1998 to 2014. He held numerous Masonic honors from around the world including as one of the Founding Fellows of The Masonic Society.

I met RWB Jackson a couple of times at Masonic Week. When his book "Masonic Perspectives - The Thoughts of a Grand Secretary" was published, he was selling it at a table at Masonic Week. I bought the book and asked him to autograph it for me.

As I was flipping through the book, I noticed that he had written a couple articles on the topic of Scouting. We had a conversation about the similarities between Scouting and Freemasonry. RWB Jackson, like myself, is an Eagle Scout and has been involved in Scouting as both youth and adult leaders. It was a fascinating conversation.

In his book, he wrote about speaking at an Eagle Court of Honor offering some thoughts on the influence, and said:

"We cannot take a step in our lives without the influence of others. We will be nothing more at any time than a reflection of the influence of others along with our modifications. The poet Markham expressed it well when he wrote: 'There is a destiny that makes us brothers. None goes his way alone. All that we send into the lives of others comes back into our own.' So my brother Eagles, will you go beyond the ordinary? It is possible but it is up to you. Accept what scouting has to offer. Learn! Learn the meaning of the broth-

erhood of man, and give to others in equal measure what others have given to you. Maybe, then just maybe, you may rise above the ordinary."

Though RWB Jackson was speaking to young Eagle Scouts, his words are equally applicable to Freemasonry. We are influenced by others and thereby we also influence others ourselves. As Freemasons, we have a tremendous opportunity to use this ability to influence others to help improve our individual communities having a positive impact upon the lives of others.

What will the legacy of RWB Jackson be? His challenge to raise the bar of Freemasonry will endure for the decades to come. I can't think of a better way to honor the memory of RWB Jackson than by going out into your community having a positive influence on others, exerting kindness to your brothers, and helping your lodge become the very best it can be to impact all of mankind.

Are We Men of Faith,
or Men of Science?

“*Cogito Ergo Sum*” - “*I think; therefore I am.*” [1]

Disclaimer:

The topic I am about to discuss is merely that of my own opinion. Not a single person could ever speak for Freemasonry in the macro sense.

In my observation, I see the topic of faith often being viewed as a polarized image against the backdrop of the never-ending scientific discoveries and innovations. The inevitable process is the “accelerating change,” which is the internet umbrella term for various forms of technocratic progression [2]

In a nutshell, this is the scientific terminology used to describe the rate of progression within the various fields of the liberal arts and sciences, measuring the timeline and weighing the proverbial scales of technological innovation within our society since the beginning of time.

According to “Moore’s Law” [3]

The rate of acceleration for the number of transistors within a circuit will increase while decreasing in size within the duration of a 2-year cycle. So hypothetically speaking, our “state of the art” tech will adapt and expand every few years, becoming more efficient, faster, and more portable. During this process, we are likely to expect a plethora of affordable technologies. These “tech” products are now available for the everyday consumer. For example: hypothetically, cell phones weren’t around in the year 1950; somehow, if it were so, would you imagine the hefty price tag associated with a device like this during the ‘50s? The common person most certainly could never afford

this luxury--a luxury that we amply enjoy today. Technology is “en vogue.” It’s cool, it’s affordable, and it’s here to stay. It has become vital for our sustenance and safety as a society.

As Freemasons, we are taught a lesson in Masonry-Masonry, that man is dependent on one another for our progress and safety as a society. This ideal, in essence, sounds lofty and beautiful to read on paper, as the Masonic ritual eloquently reminds us of the importance of this brotherhood for the benefit of all mankind. However, I believe that technology will be the deciding factor in our survival and progress on this planet. And in knowing as much, I also realize (for lack of a better term) a conundrum, a caveat of sorts. This is the crossroad where science and faith intersect. For example, “The God Spot” in the brain, which reacts whenever we observe or experience a spiritual sensation. [4]

Are faith-based experiences something that science could someday replicate with artificial intelligence? Is it somewhat of a plausible possibility that someday, members of the Masonic fraternity could interact with each other in a virtual reality environment? Is it a relative possibility, given the positivity rates for viral infections across the globe, that Freemasonry might have to adjust to a hybrid or augmented reality alternative? Is it also a strange possibility that maybe someday a vaccination passport and dues card may or may not be the appropriate forms of identification to bring to a Masonic event? These are all valid questions that have yet to be determined, and not without much controversy. In our Masonic jurisdiction here in Illinois, virtual or hybrid meetings are now available to us for the

safety of our members. [5]

It is during trying times like today, where “necessity is the mother of all invention.” In my humble opinion, we as Freemasons should come together right now, in solidarity, to ensure our safety and survival on this planet during times of pandemic and civil unrest. As the Masonic ritual reminds us, the sentiments about the “liberal arts and sciences” serve as echoes from the age of the enlightenment period. I can say in earnest that I believe that the study of science can bring us closer to our creator by understanding the knowledge of divine wisdom.

For thousands of years on this planet, science and religion have often been iconoclastic viewpoints, mankind lacking the appropriate scientific evidence to substantiate the claims made by the various world religions in regards to creation myths and other unexplained mysteries of life. Then, as in the 17th century. The light of Masonic wisdom shook up the fabric of modern society. This period in world history is known as the “Age of Enlightenment” [6]

The Age of Enlightenment gave rise to some of the greatest “free thinkers” and idealists from this period. The notable figures most associated with the enlightenment era, the likes of some, who are: Alexander Hamilton (1755 or 1757-1804), Benjamin Franklin (1706-1790), Carl Linnaeus (1707-1778), David Hume (1711-1776), Emmanuel Swedenborg (1688 - 1772), Francis Bacon (1561-1626), George Washington (1732-1799), Isaac Newton (1642-1727), Rene Descartes (1596-1650), Robert Burns (1759-1796), Thomas Jefferson (1743-1826), Thomas Paine (1737-1809), Voltaire, (1694-1778), William Shakespeare (1564 - 1616), Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756 -1791)

Background of notable Masonic members of The Age of Enlightenment:

Robert Burns (1759-1796):

“Well educated in a variety of subjects, from Scottish history and folklore to literature, Burns was forced to assist his father in working on the family farm, and took over at 25 when his father died in 1784 [7] By 28, Burns was beginning to be well known in his



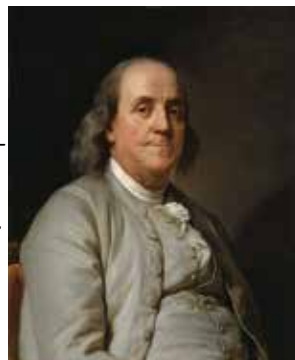
literary career; In 1786 he published “Poems: Chiefly in Scottish Dialect,” which was expanded in 1787 and again in 1793. Beginning in 1786, Burns would spend much time in Edinburgh among the elite and intellectuals of Scottish society. “[8]

Masonic:

Robert Burns was initiated as an Entered Apprentice in Lodge St. David, Tarbolton on 4 July (ironic date) 1781, at the age of 23. His initiation fee was 12s 6d, and paid on the same date. [9]

Benjamin Franklin: (1/17/1706 - 4/17/1790):

“Franklin was a signer of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States. Printer, publisher, inventor, scientist, politician, diplomat, and statesman. Elected a member of the royal society because of his scientific discoveries. A friend of Voltaire and assisted in raising him, April 7, 1778.” [10]



Masonic:

“Early in the year 1731, we find that the young printer was Entered, Passed, and Raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason in St. John’s Lodge, held at the Tun Tavern in Water St., Philadelphia. The cost of his entrance fee was three pounds sterling. “Note: American Lodge of Research transactions, volume six, No. 1 pg. 65 says this date is June 24, 1731. [11] Franklin was made a member of “Loge des Neuf Soeurs,” sometimes called the Lodge of Nine Muses, in Paris, in 1777, and was elected Venerable (Worshipful Master) in May 1779, and re-elected the following year.” [12]

Francois - Marie Arouet. [Voltaire] (1694-1778):

French Philosopher and Freemason “Voltaire’ was a staunch supporter of religious tolerance during a time of exclusion and xenophobia.

“It does not require great art, or magnificently trained eloquence, to prove that Chris-



tians should tolerate each other. I, however, am going further: I say that we should regard all men as our brothers. What? The Turk, my brother? The Jew? The Siam? Yes, without doubt; are we not all children of the same father and creatures of the same God?" [13]



Masonic:

Voltaire was initiated at the Lodge of Nine Sisters in Paris.

“The Lodge of the Nine Sisters in making virtue its base has dedicated itself to fostering the arts and sciences. The aim of the lodge is to restore them to their place of dignity. Did not the arts and sciences serve as the foundation of great civilizations and nations? Work then with zeal to preserve and to advance civilization and our fraternity. Remember then that the base supports the edifice. Decorate both remembering that ornaments should not mask the dignity of Freemasonry...” [14]

“Although not a member of the Craft, Voltaire in flagrant violations of Masonic regulations was allowed on March 21, 1778. To attend as a visitor the meeting of Nine Sisters. After this meeting, the philosophy of Ferney, who evidently enjoyed this session of the lodge, informed Lalande that he would consent to be initiated during its next meeting. The induction ceremonies of Voltaire were held on Tuesday, April 7, 1778, and were not according to stated Masonic procedures. Because of Voltaire’s age and poor health, the Master Lalande was constrained to abbreviate the initiation ceremonies. Leaning on the arm of his guide, Benjamin Franklin, the blindfolded Voltaire was escorted into the lodge chamber and was asked several questions about his moral conduct. Without being required to receive the three mandatory degrees of blue lodge masonry, he was informed of the signs, secrets, and symbols of the Craft and then was proclaimed a member of the order and the Nine Sisters.” [15]

The Age of Enlightenment attracted notable prospects of the era to join the ancient mysteries. Freemasonry, as we know it today, has a deeply rooted lineage to The Age of Enlightenment’s ideas and philosophies that echo sentiments of alchemical transmutations, moral and ethical values, and a belief of deity coinciding with human characteristics. The notion of the rough ashlar versus a perfect ashlar, utilizing the science of geometry to enhance the human experience in a speculative manner.

(Biblical References to Science):

Note: I realize that Freemasonry is nonsectarian and, for the most part, non-dogmatic. There’s a number of holy texts I could reference and cite as my inspiration. However, I’ve spent parts of my early childhood learning about the stories contained within the “Holy Bible.” Since I am most familiar with and most comfortable citing this text. I will pull some interesting references with regards to how science and faith are two interwoven links in the same chain. In our Masonic ritual, the Holy Bible is mentioned as the “rule and guide” to our faith. So, for cultural significance, of the Bible in the Masonic ritual. I procured these quotes for context, as they pertain to Freemasonry; the following passages are from the King James Version of the Holy Bible.

Isaiah 40:12 - “Who hath measured the waters in the hollow of his hand, and meted out heaven with the span, and comprehended the dust of the earth in a measure, and weighed the mountains in scales, and the hills in a balance?”

Ecclesiastes 1:13 - “And I gave my heart to seek and search out by wisdom concerning all things that are done under heaven: this sore travail hath God given to the sons of man to be exercised therewith.”

Job 38:4-6 “Where wast thou when I laid the foundations of the earth? declare, if thou hast understanding. Who hath laid the measures thereof, if thou knowest? Or who hath stretched the line upon it? Whereupon are the foundations thereof fastened? or who laid the cornerstone thereof?”

From my interpretations of these Bible verses:

The Grand Architect of The Universe warrants mankind to seek the knowledge of divinity. Ultimately, this experience will bring us closer to our creator, to better understand our relationship to each other as

a human race and to our surrounding environment.
“As above, so below.”

We live in a society that nourishes these ideas about connectivity and creativity. A society that utilizes and encourages the latest technology for nearly every facet of our livelihood. It's a very interesting conundrum to see the members of our ancient fraternity having opposing viewpoints on these issues—matters such as inoculation, social distancing, virtual reality, social media & cyber lodges.

It's interesting to note that, while we have these excellent and very poignant diatribes among ourselves as fellow brethren of the Craft. The profane world outside of our fraternity may have a laundry list of concerns about us as a global organization—that which may be considered alarming and, at moments, even disturbing. More notably, the Grand Lodge of Ireland fell victim to a recent arson attack. The scene of the incident occurred at the Grand Lodge building located on Molesworth Street. The investigation is currently still pending. The enemies of the Craft have used technology to slander the reputation of our beloved institution. Suppose Freemasonry as a whole does not use the state-of-the-art technology available. The fraternity will lose the disinformation battle. From random manifestos showing up to lodges to the extreme acts of defiling our institutions and “canceling” our rich history as a fraternity. [16]

In conclusion, as for the Freemasons. Are we men of faith or men of science? I believe that the answer is both. The Masonic “egregor” is a very strong and ancient energy current, a current that transcends the boundaries and limitations of time itself. The old adage comes to mind “history repeats itself,” this common theme of a repeated cycle of changing. It feels like we are approaching the Age of Enlightenment

within this present time. That in which spirituality and scientific revolutions will take mankind to the zenith of human triumph and ingenuity. As the pseudo-scientific billionaires of the world, race to colonize the Moon and the planet Mars. As Freemasons, it is imperative for our survival to embrace change with a sense of urgency; without making any innovations in Masonry, the fraternity as a whole is capable of adapting to its surroundings whilst keeping the core tenets of brotherly love, relief and truth, as true to its tradition, an lineage to the ancient times also referred to as the “vulgar era.” The era in which the Luddites pondered our ancient mysteries. The cowan then leaves the profane world behind, guided by ancient wisdom and illumination.

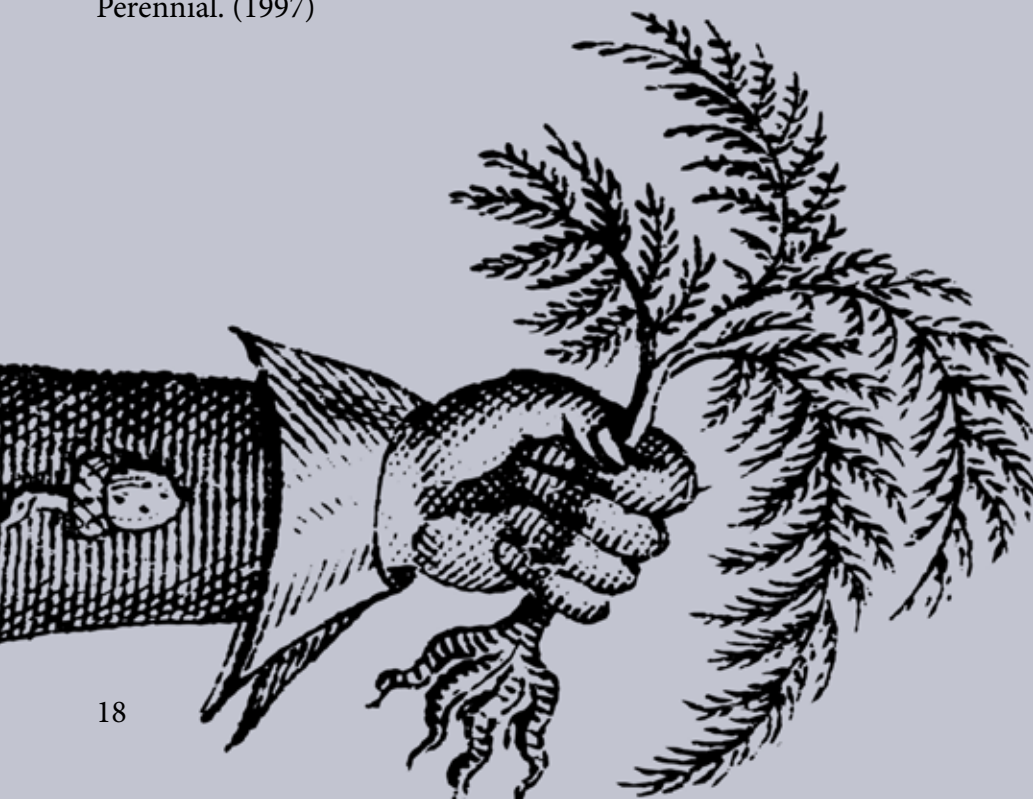

Reader's Corner

The Craft and Its Symbols: Opening the Door to Masonic Symbolism

In my opinion, the book entitled *The Craft and Its Symbols: Opening the Door to Masonic Symbolism* by Bro. Allen E. Roberts is a great work that is well written and easily understood and should accompa-

ny every Masonic Bible given to the newly raised Master Mason. I feel so strongly about providing this book to all Master Masons because it explains in detail most of the symbols that we are introduced to throughout our journey through the symbolic degrees. This book is excellent because it can serve as an introduction for new Master Masons, allowing them to gain a deeper understanding of some of Masonry's symbols and serve as a reminder for those seasoned Master Masons.

Bro. Roberts begins his book by discussing and describing the Entered Apprentice Degree and its symbolism. He describes how your journey through the first degree is symbolically and spiritually a re-birth. He also explains what Masonry is, its origins, and how there were originally only two degrees. The creation of the third degree dated between 1725 and 1738, the oldest known Masonic document, the Regius Poem, places Masonry in England at or around 526 A.D., and more. Bro. Roberts explained things that I do not recall from the ritual, such as the meaning behind the removal of the shoe, or the cable-tow, etc. In addition to explaining some of the meanings of the symbols that were not explained, he also offered alternative definitions to the symbols we do know, offering a more profound understanding for new and seasoned Master Masons alike.

Bro. Roberts describes the three degrees as symbol-

izing stages in life, Infancy, Manhood, and old age. When discussing the Fellowcraft Degree, he provides additional definitions for the working tools. In our journey into manhood or the Fellowcraft Degree, Bro. Roberts offered an alternative explanation of the flight of winding stairs that was unfamiliar to me. When discussing the symbols of the Master Mason's Degree, Bro. Roberts yet again offers an additional meaning to that of the cable-tow. One thing that caught my attention was when Bro. Roberts explained the journey from Entered Apprentice through Fellowcraft to the doorsteps of the Master Mason's Degree, symbolically, he did this when he stated, "Symbolically, you spent seven years in learning that worldly attraction, money, and other material things are not important. They are only important if they can be used to benefit your fellow man. You went through five more years, symbolically, in self-analysis. You learned to control your mind, your body, and your heart. You used the tools of architecture to square, level, and plumb your spiritual Temple. You proved to your lodge that you were ready to search for Truth. You had squared your life and actions perfectly". (p. 63-64) To me, the above statement can also be one's journey through life; in the beginning, you learned the basics, as a teen, you figured yourself out, and as a man or a Master Mason, your journey continues as you learn the world.

In continuing with this wonderfully written book by Bro. Roberts, he tells us about Bro. Thomas Smith Webb, who has been called the "father" of ritual in America, as he developed his own version of the English Ritual by Bro. William Preston. One meaningful



revelation that Bro. Roberts introduced me to in this book was that the altar and its Volume of Sacred Law, Square, and Compasses symbolize the Ark of the Covenant.

Overall, I immensely enjoyed Bro. Robert's book entitled *The Craft and Its Symbols: Opening the Door to Masonic Symbolism*, I thought it was a great book that every Master Mason should acquire and read. Bro. Roberts is a great writer, and I look forward to reading more of his works, as I learned a great deal.

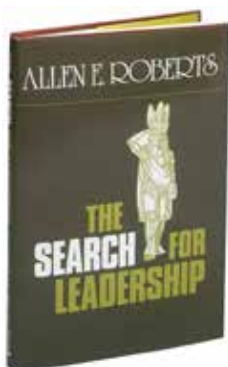
G. Washington: Master Mason

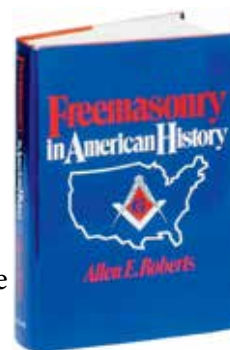
The Search for Leadership

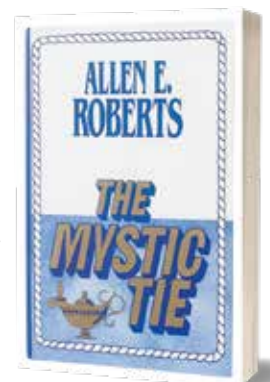
Freemasonry in American History

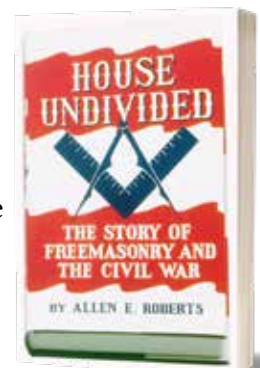
